Basic Rules for a Formal Rhetorical Analysis:

- 1. Never use first or second person. (That means no 'I' or 'we' or 'our' or 'my' or 'you/your' or 'us')
- 2. Explanations should be at least **twice** as long as the textual evidence.
- 3. Explanations should be a **minimum of two sentences** regardless of the length of textual evidence.
- 4. Textual evidence should be **less than five lines**. If four lines or more, block indent is necessary.
- 5. Always introduce a quotation. (According to Professor Jones of Comparative Statistics, ...)
- 6. Include the titles of quoted individuals or institutions to amplify ethos in your writing.
- 7. Always include an in-text citation that matches in your bibliography. (MLA format)
- 8. Always include a bibliography. (MLA= Works Cited)
- 9. Each paragraph should follow the advanced expository writing structure.
- 10. Be critical. Use higher-order thinking. Include rhetorical appeals.

Suggestions: Get away from personified introductions to quotations. Instead of saying [it states] or [the words state], accredit the "words" and the "it" to the person or group responsible for perpetuating that information. Use commas between subordinate and independent clauses. Write out numbers consistently.

Advanced Expository Paragraphing. Each body paragraph should have the following components:

- 1. **Topic Sentence** that identifies the rhetorical device under review and how it contributes to the overarching purpose of the text.
- 2. **Elaboration** that explains a little bit more about the particular device's function in the text.
- 3. **Introduction to the Quotation 1** that indicates who is speaking or writing.
- 4. **Quotation 1** that manifests as a direct quotation and includes an in-text citation.
- 5. **Explanation 1** that explores how this particular quotation demonstrates the rhetorical device.
- 6. **Introduction to the Quotation 2** that indicates who is speaking or writing. This must be longer than the selected quotation.
- 7. **Quotation 2** that manifests as a direct quotation and includes an in-text citation.
- 8. **Explanation 2** that explores how this particular quotation demonstrates the rhetorical device. This must be longer than the selected quotation.
- 9. **Tie Back to Thesis** that shows the connection to the greater purpose of the memoir
